## Lot 530 Marble figure "The Bride" by O. Andreon, Rome, 5 ft high on a carved dark marble pedestal

Current location unknown. Sold in the 1947 sale for £20.

 $^{\prime}$ O. Andreon' was Orazio Andreoni an Italian 19 $^{\text{th}}$  century sculptor based in Rome. The Spanish Bride was signed and dated 1888.

Anton Bantock reported that the white marble figure was sold for £20 in the sale and then vanished without trace. It reappeared when it was sold at a public auction by Sotheby's on the 20<sup>th</sup> of November 1997 as Lot 97.

We do not know when the sculpture was acquired. Greville and Emily travelled widely after their marriage in 1884. They had an 18 month honeymoon. Anton reported:

'In Rome Emily was photographed in a fashionable studio, the print survives: a statuesque pose making the most of her lovely neck and shoulders, the expression cool, if not haughty.'

Maybe they visited the sculptor's workshop, admired his work, and commissioned a piece which reflected their newly-wed status. We will never know.

The 1901 Inventory of Ashton Court Mansion includes a possible description of the figure in the Drawing Room (Long Gallery).

"Group of figures - The bride - Italian School".

In the 1915 Inventory it is described as 'The Bride' and is in the Long Gallery.

The figure can be seen quite clearly in these images of the Long Gallery (c1927).
